1. Introduction

The Project involves the upgrade of approximately 56 km of an existing unpaved and seasonally inaccessible road between Baljuvon and the Sari Khosor waterfall area in Baljuvon District, Khatlon Region, Republic of Tajikistan. The road will be upgraded to a two-lane Category V mountain road standard and includes 10 bridge structures, 121 culverts, approximately 20.5 km of riverbank protection along the Shurobdaryo River, and slope stabilisation at 100 identified hazard locations. The corridor serves approximately 19 settlements with a combined population of more than 6,000 residents across two jamoats.

The Project is implemented by the Project Implementation Unit for Road Rehabilitation (PIURR) under the Ministry of Transport of the Republic of Tajikistan. Financing is under consideration by the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD). The environmental and social studies have been prepared by the consulting company VISTA Environment. The Project has been classified as Category A under the EBRD Environmental and Social Policy (2024).

The Project has reached the stage at which the ESIA has been prepared and disclosed for public review and comment. This Public Consultation Report (PCR) presents a summary of that disclosure and consultation process, the feedback received from stakeholders, and PIURR's response to that feedback.

1.1 Relationship to other Project documents

2. Requirements for stakeholder engagement for ESIA disclosure

2.1 National requirements

Environmental assessment and public participation in the Republic of Tajikistan are governed principally by the Law on Environmental Protection and the Law on Ecological Expertise, together with the associated regulations on public participation in environmental decision-making. The Project has obtained environmental approval through the State Ecological Expertise (SEE) issued by the Committee for Environmental Protection (CEP).

The requirements most relevant to the disclosure of this ESIA are:

- The EIA report is made publicly available for review, including through the official website of the Ministry of Transport.
- A public consultation is convened and minuted, with an attendance record retained by the implementing agency.
- Written comments and observations may be submitted within 30 days following the public consultation. Participants at the consultation of 23 July 2026 were informed of this period, which therefore runs to 22 August 2026.

Land acquisition and compensation are governed by the Land Code and the associated regulations on compensation for land withdrawal. No transboundary consultation requirements apply to this Project.

2.2 EBRD requirements

The EBRD Environmental and Social Policy (2024) and Environmental and Social Requirement 10 apply. For a Category A project the requirements governing this disclosure phase are:

- Disclosure of the ESIA package for a minimum of 120 calendar days before consideration of the Project by the EBRD Board of Directors.
- Disclosure of information that is relevant, understandable and accessible, in the local language, free of charge.
- Meaningful consultation — a two-way process, free of manipulation, interference, coercion or intimidation, giving stakeholders sufficient time to review the information and express their views.
- Consultation that is inclusive, with measures to remove barriers to participation for those who may be disadvantaged or vulnerable.
- Public disclosure by the client of a summary of the disclosure and consultation process, the stakeholder feedback received and the client's response to that feedback. This PCR is that summary, required under ESR10 paragraph 33.
- A functioning grievance mechanism available throughout the Project.

No other lender requirements apply at the date of this report.

2.3 Reconciling the two frameworks

Where national requirements and EBRD requirements differ, the Project applies the higher standard. The material difference for this disclosure phase concerns the comment period.

Participants at the consultation were informed that the EIA report could be reviewed through the official website of the Ministry of Transport. Hard-copy information leaflets were distributed at the meeting and the presentation was delivered orally in Tajik, consistent with the SEP commitments on printed materials and verbal explanation for stakeholders with low literacy.

SEP Table 6 identifies the disclosure channels for the draft ESIA package as the project website, local authority offices, public venues such as jamoat buildings, and financiers' websites where required, supported by consultation notices on local authority noticeboards and in community venues, and a press notice at the ESIA disclosure stage under SEP Table 3.

The Project's environmental and social documentation was disclosed on 30 July 2026 on the official website of the Ministry of Transport of the Republic of Tajikistan under “Ministry” → “Cooperation with EBRD”.

The main documentation package is available in Russian and English, while certain documents have also been prepared in Tajik, in accordance with the language versions applicable to those documents.

3.2 Notification

The public consultation of 23 July 2026 was convened by PIURR and notified through the Executive Authority of Baljuvon District and the Baljuvon town jamoat, and through the district's subordinate government agencies, which in turn notified their staff. The event was held at the Office of the Local Executive Authority of Baljuvon District, commencing at 09:00.

The event was attended by Project-affected persons and local residents, representatives of local authorities and subordinate district institutions, representatives of PIURR and the Consultant, Vista Environment, as well as other interested stakeholders.

During the consultation, information was presented on the Project, the EBRD Environmental and Social Policy, the main findings of the Environmental and Social Impact Assessment (ESIA), the provisions of the Resettlement Plan, and the grievance redress mechanism. Printed information materials were distributed to participants, followed by an open question-and-answer session.

PIURR had also engaged with local authorities and communities at an earlier stage of preparation of the environmental and social documentation. In particular, by Letter No. 2/108 dated 9 April 2026, PIURR requested assistance in organising public consultations scheduled for 20 April 2026 in Baljuvon and settlements of the Sari Khosor Jamoat.

In addition, as part of the preparations for the public consultation during the disclosure period, PIURR, by Letter No. 2-212 dated 16 July 2026, requested the Local Executive Authority of Baljuvon District to assist with the organisation of the public consultation and facilitate the participation of local residents.

Records of the Public Consultation and attendance registered dated 23rd July 2026 are attached in Annexes A and B. Additionally Annex D contains official letters issued by PIU to the local authorities prior to consultations:

1. PIURR Letter No. 2/108 dated 9 April 2026 addressed to the Local Executive Authority of Baljuvon District, requesting assistance in organising public consultations with local communities scheduled for 20 April 2026, together with materials from the earlier consultations;
2. PIURR Letter No. 2/109 dated 9 April 2026 addressed to the Committee for Environmental Protection under the Government of the Republic of Tajikistan regarding the organisation of a working meeting on the environmental sensitivity of the Project area, including environmental protection and biodiversity matters within the Baljuvon–Sari Khosor Project area;
3. PIURR Letter No. 2/212 dated 16 July 2026 addressed to the Local Executive Authority of Baljuvon District, requesting assistance in organising the public consultation and facilitating the participation of local residents.

3.4 Attendance and participation

One public consultation event has been held during the disclosure period. Aggregate attendance figures are set out below. The signed attendance register is reproduced at Annex B.

The minutes record that not all participants were able to register, owing to time constraints at the event; total attendance therefore exceeds the number of signatures on the register. The composition of the registered attendance, by broad sector and without job titles or names, was approximately: health and medical services 22%; culture, museums, sport and youth 18%; education 16%; district administration and finance 15%; social protection and employment 6%; banking 4%; recorded by institutional abbreviation only 19%.

Female participation at 42.14% of recorded attendance is a substantive level of participation by women for a rural district of this size and indicates that the notification process reached women effectively.

3.5 Measures to support participation

- Proceedings conducted orally in Tajik, so that participants with limited literacy were not dependent on written materials.
- Hard-copy information leaflets distributed during the session, addressing the low rate of internet access in the district.
- Event held in a public building in the district centre, at ground level, in a hall with capacity substantially greater than attendance.
- Questions taken openly from the floor and answered directly by the working group.
- Grievance channels published in Tajik and Russian, including a telephone number and the option to submit anonymously.

3.6 Engagement undertaken during ESIA preparation

Engagement carried out during preparation of the ESIA is documented in full in SEP Table 4 and in the stakeholder engagement section of the ESIA, and is not repeated here. It is summarised below because it establishes the engagement on which the disclosed assessment rests, and because the corridor communities, affected households and institutional stakeholders consulted at that stage are the same stakeholders addressed by the disclosure of the final ESIA.

Feedback from this engagement was incorporated into the assessment. Points raised at the April 2026 consultations led to confirmation that street lighting would be provided in settlement sections, to expanded mitigation in the ESIA for the protection of the overhead electricity network during construction, and to confirmation that a Gender Action Plan will be prepared by PIURR.

3.7 Grievances relating to the engagement process

No grievances relating to the disclosure or consultation process itself have been received to the date of this report. Grievances are recorded and tracked to resolution in the grievance register maintained by PIURR, and may be submitted in person via the Community Liaison Officer, in writing via grievance boxes or the jamoat and district authorities, by telephone on +992 888 841 321, by email to munisa-piurr@mail.ru, or anonymously. Complaints relating to sexual exploitation, abuse or harassment are handled through a separate, confidential, survivor-centred process. Where a grievance remains unresolved after escalation through the Project mechanism it may be referred to the EBRD Independent Project Accountability Mechanism.

4. Summary of stakeholder feedback and Client response

4.1 How feedback is reviewed

All feedback received during the disclosure period — whether raised orally at a consultation, submitted in writing, or received through the Grievance Redress Mechanism — is logged on receipt and considered by PIURR with the ESIA consultant. Each item is assessed to determine whether it requires a revision to the ESIA package, and the outcome is recorded together with the reasoning, including where no change was made. Items that are in substance grievances rather than comments on the assessment are transferred to the Grievance Redress Mechanism and the person is informed.

Where feedback does not trigger a material change requiring significant revision of the ESIA, and where a clarification adequately addresses the point, the clarification is recorded in this report rather than by reissuing the whole ESIA package. Where additional mitigation is agreed, the ESMP is updated and this report is annexed to the ESIA so that the final disclosure presents the complete set of commitments and clarifications.

4.2 How engagement was documented

The public consultation of 23 July 2026 was minuted by PIURR in Tajik, with an English translation. The minutes record the participants by category, the agenda, the Project representatives present, the information provided, and the questions raised with the responses given. An attendance register was circulated for signature, recording name, occupation and signature, and confirming receipt of information on the EIA and on land allocation for resettlement. A photographic record was taken. The minutes, register and photographs are retained by PIURR on the project file. The minutes are summarised at Annex A, and the signed attendance register and the photographic record are reproduced at Annex B, in the form in which they were recorded at the event.

One recorded response was minuted in Russian rather than Tajik. It has been translated for this report, and future minutes are to be maintained in Tajik with an English translation.

4.3 Feedback received

No written comments or observations have been received to the date of this report. The national comment period announced at the consultation runs to 22 August 2026 and the EBRD 120-day disclosure period remains open, so this position is expected to change and this section will be completed accordingly.

The feedback received to date consists of three questions raised from the floor at the public consultation of 23 July 2026. All three concerned the governance of the Project rather than its technical assessment: who will hold the Project to account, how redress can be obtained, and who qualifies for compensation.

4.4 Trends in the feedback

The feedback received during the disclosure period concerned the governance of the Project rather than the technical content of the assessment: the arrangements for monitoring compliance, the route for raising questions and grievances, and the eligibility of informal users for compensation. Each was addressed by clarification at the meeting and each is recorded in Section 4.3 above. No concern was raised regarding the findings of the environmental and social assessment or the mitigation measures proposed.

4.5 Diverging views

No diverging views between stakeholder groups have been identified to the date of this report.

4.6 Grievances received during the disclosure period

No grievances relating to the environmental and social risks and impacts of the Project have been received through the Grievance Redress Mechanism during the disclosure period to the date of this report.

4.7 Changes to the ESIA package arising from disclosure

No changes to the ESIA package have arisen from disclosure-phase feedback to date. The three questions recorded were addressed by clarification, and each clarification is reflected in Section 4.3 above. Should feedback received before the close of the disclosure period require changes, those changes will be recorded here, the ESMP will be updated with any additional mitigation measures agreed, and this report will be annexed to the final ESIA.

- The commitment that no works begin on any parcel until the affected person has been fully compensated and notified in writing by PIURR.
- How to review the ESIA package and how to submit comments.
- The Grievance Redress Mechanism: channels, escalation route, timescales, and the availability of the EBRD Independent Project Accountability Mechanism.
